The Song of Solomon is a series of songs between Solomon and the Shulamite woman (from Shulem).

While Solomon composed 1,005 songs, he named this one "The Song of Songs," meaning a very excellent song, or the most surpassing of all his songs.

Whether you have a love life, had a love life, or want a love life, there is truth in this book in the Bible for you to apply for God's glory.

For ten weeks, we will read Song of Solomon verse by verse and lean into God's Word on what it means to be a godly man or woman.

WEEK 1: THE MAN

¹ The Song of Songs, which is Solomon's.

CHARACTERISTICS OF A GODLY WOMAN

- 1. A holy woman has surrendered to the lordship of Christ and is being sanctified by His grace.
 - A relationship with Jesus is the foundation of knowing one's identity in Christ.
- 2. A "hot" woman knows that a woman's beauty does not come from the world's standards or gimmicks, but beauty is far more than an outward appearance.
 - A woman who fears the Lord, knows her identity in Jesus, and humbly walks out that confidence is far more precious than jewels.
- 3. A humble woman is more concerned about the kingdom of God than herself.
 - She is willing to serve others and knows her strength comes from the Lord.
- 4. A hardworking woman strives to further the kingdom and honor God with her talents and abilities.
 - She is not idle, but perseveres through storms and trusts that God will never fail.





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THE POINT

Flee sexual immorality. You are not your own; you were bought with a price, so glorify God in your body.

(SEE 1 CORINTHIANS 6:18-20)

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PURSUING PURITY

1. Write the Word of God on your heart. (Hebrews 4:12)

The more that we have Scripture in our hearts and minds, the more we understand that our value and satisfaction are in Jesus and not in the things of this world.

2. Do not play with fire. (Matthew 26:41)

If we put ourselves in tempting situations, we are setting ourselves up to fall. Be intentional about where you go and what you do.

3. Guard your eyes. (Matthew 6:22-23)

The images that we take in eventually influence what we think and do.

4. Lead your family and friends. (Deuteronomy 6:4-8)

Intentional conversations about purity can produce more accountability and authenticity. Let God's truth be louder than the rest of the world in the lives of your family and friends.



THE POINT

Marriage is a covenant not a contract. A contract says, "If you...then I..." A covenant says, "No matter what, I DO."

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ACTION STEP

If you're not married but desire to be,

pray the Holy Spirit would help you to wait well as you trust in God's timing.

If you are married, go home and look through your wedding photo album or watch your wedding day video. Talk about memories from that day and remember why you married each other. Set time aside to pray intentionally for and with your spouse. Use the following prayer prompts to pray specifically for your marriage this week.

PRAYER PROMPTS

Prompt 1: Take time to sit in God's deep love for you. Thank Him for the health of your marriage and/or soak in His compassion for you in any areas of hurt. Ask Him to show you steps toward healing and forgiveness and know that He is faithful to work all things for your good.

Prompt 2: Pray for the Holy Spirit's wisdom and guidance as you continue to work toward the abundant marriage God intends for you. Seek daily to follow the Holy Spirit's leading.

Prompt 3: Pray for patience and wonder as you seek to know each other deeply and for ears to hear each other's hearts without judgment.

Prompt 4: Pray for joy to continuously enter and grow in your marriage - a deep, passionate joy that can only come from an intimate relationship with Jesus Christ.

Prompt 5: Pray for the strength that comes only from Christ to reflect God's overwhelming love to your spouse despite challenges and circumstances. Husbands, love your wife as Christ loves the church and wives, respect and honor your husband as a way to glorify God.

Prompt 6: Pray for clear communication in your marriage, seeking conviction by the Holy Spirit to speak only words that are uplifting and encouraging. Pray for grace in your speech – both in everyday conversation and in times of conflict. Pray that your words be tempered with kindness, love and encouragement.

Prompt 7: Pray that your marriage honors God as the one thing that drives everything, including your communication, finances and service to others and that your marriage covenant demonstrates Christ's love to those around you.



THE POINT

The key to great sex is being a great servant of your spouse.

There isn't a magic recipe, formula or prescription for how to have great sex with your spouse. However, there are some key principles in Scripture that can guide us in loving our mate the way God intended and cultivating an environment for intimacy.

PRINCIPLE #1: INTIMACY WITH JESUS

Your love for your spouse can only be as strong as your relationship with God. Growing in intimacy with the Lord produces fruit in your marital intimacy. *(1 John 4:7)*

PRINCIPLE #2: SERVE YOUR SPOUSE

Sexual intimacy is the ultimate expression of the oneness that a husband and wife share in all areas of life. This unity is achieved as they mutually submit to one another out of reverence for Christ. (Ephesians 5:22-33)

PRINCIPLE #3: PURSUE PURITY

Within the context of marriage, there is creativity and freedom in sex. However, sexual immorality (infidelity, pornography, wandering thoughts, etc.) defies God's perfect design for sex and will kill the intimacy in your relationship. *(Hebrews 13:4)*

A NOTE ABOUT SEXUAL HEALING: Because we live in a broken world, we have been impacted by some sort of sexual perversion in our life; a twisting of God's original design for sex. It could have been abuse, a traumatic sexual experience, a visual you saw or something you heard as a young child. Only your heavenly Father can heal these deep wounds and He does so in many ways. Ask God to reveal any wounds you may have from your past regarding sexual immorality or perversion and ask Him to heal them so that you can lead a life of sexual integrity. If needed, professional counseling can be a gift from God in your life. Check out coe22.com/care for a list of recommended counselors.

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FIGHTING FAIR

- Listen and validate each other's feelings by using a statement like, "when you say ______, I hear/feel _____."
 (Example: "When you say 'what did you do all day', I hear you saying 'I haven't done enough."")
- Set healthy expectations that have been shared and agreed upon.
- Watch your words i.e., no name calling, refrain from using "never" or "always", avoid words that are demeaning or condescending, no accusations.
- Watch your tone. Avoid speaking harshly or raising your voice.
- Be mindful of your location and timing. Avoid public confrontations, in front of children, serious conversations late at night, etc.

ACTION STEP

Apologize for your pride and selfishness.

Repent from fighting with the intent of

winning the fight. Commit to winning the

heart of your spouse in conflict.
