## 1825 DG Fall – WEEK 4

**Sermon Text:** Luke 10:17-20, Ezekiel 28:11-19, Isaiah 14:12-15, Luke 24:1-12

### **Names Matter.**

- **Action Step check-in: Whether you completed it or not – What did you learn about God? What did you learn about yourself?**
  - **Icebreaker:** What was the most impactful moment from this past week of Saturated?

## DISCOVER & DEEPEN

*(The goal is to grow in our relationship with Christ and each other. It is ok if you don't cover every question.)*

- 1. What is ONE thought that stuck with you from this week's sermon? Why?**
- 2. In Luke 10:17–20, Jesus reminds the disciples not to rejoice in power over demons but in their names being written in heaven. What's the difference between fighting from victory versus fighting for victory? How might that shift how you**

**handle spiritual battles today?**

- 3. Jesus said He saw Satan fall like lightning (Luke 10:18). What do you think this means? How does knowing Satan is already defeated affect your confidence in Christ?**
- 4. Ezekiel 28 and Isaiah 14 describe the pride and fall of Lucifer. What warnings do these passages give us about pride? Where do you see pride as a subtle danger in your own life?**
- 5. John 10:10 says the enemy comes to “steal, kill, and destroy.” How have you seen evidence of this in the world—or in your own story? How does worship act as warfare in those moments?**
- 6. Pastor Joby said: “Worship is declaring God alone is worthy.” In what ways do we sometimes worship ourselves, others, or even status instead? How can we practically re-center worship on God?**
- 7. The Gaithers wrote “Because He Lives” during a time of upheaval. How does the hope of the resurrection speak into our cultural unrest today? Where do you personally need to hear “Because He lives, I can face tomorrow”?**
- 8. 1 John 4:18 says perfect love drives out fear. What fears weigh on you most right now? How does Jesus’ resurrection address those fears?**
- 9. In Luke 24, the angels ask: “Why do you seek the living among the dead?” Where are we tempted to “seek life” in dead places—stuff, sex, or status? What does it look like to turn instead to the Savior?**
- 10. On the road to Emmaus, the disciples said: “Did our hearts not burn within us?” Have you ever had a moment where Scripture or worship set your heart on fire? What was that like?**
- 11. Baptism is a picture of dying to self and being raised in Christ. How does the resurrection shape your view of your identity? For anyone not yet baptized—what’s holding you back?**
- 12. What does it look like to live with both a present and eternal perspective?**
- 13. If worship is war and Jesus has already won, how should that truth shape the way you approach worship this week—both on Sundays and in your everyday life?**

## ACTION STEP

### **In light of your answers tonight, what is one step God is calling you to take this week?**

Sanctification and spiritual growth are not linear, but they always involve a step of obedience. Some will have the same next step week after week as they grow in spiritual disciplines and learn to walk in obedience. Others will have a next step that can be completed within the week.

The more you can lead individuals in making their next step SMART (specific, measurable, achievable, relevant, timely) the easier it is to walk out accountability.

Example:

1825: "My next step is to read my bible more."

Leader: "How many times this next week do you want to read your bible? When will you do it? How long? What will you read?"

1825: "I want to read when I wake up three mornings for 20 minutes."

Have a group member record next steps and share in your Group Me.

*Next week check in. How did it go? Whether you accomplished the goal or not: What did you learn about God? Yourself?*

## Prayer

### **How can we pray for you and your walk with Jesus? Close in Prayer.**

*While we are happy to pray for all things, we want to grow in authenticity by asking and sharing how we can pray for one another as we discover and deepen in our relationship with Christ and take next steps of obedience.*

**\*\*\*TIP:** *Provide index cards. Have each member write their prayer requests on a card with their name and place in the middle of the circle. At the end of group each person selects a card to pray over for the next week. Encourage members to reach out to the individual they are praying for during the week. Mixed groups: keep guys and girls cards separate. Guys pray and reach out to guys. Girls pray and reach out to girls.*
